I. Introduction.

Matthew 11:28:30 | ²⁸ "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. ²⁹ Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. ³⁰ For my yoke is easy and my burden is light."

- A. This passage of Scripture is probably one of the most comforting in all of the Bible. On a person level, I find myself coming back to these words of Jesus, and similar passages like it, to reorient myself with what He's really like in His heart of hearts. The more I think long about what Jesus said He was like, the more peaceful my heart becomes.
- B. Tonight, we're going to break down a few key truths contained in these short three verses.
- II. "I will give you rest."
- A. Before we start anywhere else, I want to start with the notion that <u>it's in God's heart that we would experience a restful, or peaceful, relationship with Him</u>. Jesus wants us to have a friendly relationship that is relaxed and casual. He doesn't want us to constantly be unsure of our relationship so that we stay nervous and do things for Him out of fear. He doesn't want us always wondering where we're at with Him. He just wants us to experience the rest that comes from knowing He values us and wants to be together.
- B. We all want friendships and relationships that are relaxed, not based on putting on an act all the time. Jesus says I'm that guy you can be with and you can just be with Me as you are.
- C. We will all get spiritually weary at some point. Perhaps you're in a season of weariness now feeling like everything is so heavy and weighty that you can't go on. There's an answer for it...

III. "Come to me."

- A. The core message of the gospel, the heart of Christianity, is <u>come to Me</u>—a real actual person, Jesus. It's not first and foremost, come to morals, rules or works. It's "come to Me" and "get to know Me" and "spend time with Me so you actually know who I am and what I'm like." Jesus died for a deep and authentic relationship with us, not just so we would do work for Him.
- B. This "come to Me" speaks of a devotional life, but not just a check-the-box devotional life. It speaks of a devotional life that is deeply rooted in the rich understanding that <u>Jesus wants to be with us</u>. It's also a devotional life rooted in the knowledge that <u>Jesus wants to be with us when we're spiritually weary, burdened, broken and burnt-out</u>. He wants us to come to Him in that condition. He doesn't want us to try to fake it or "get cleaned up" before we come to Him. He wants us talking to Him in our worst moments and our difficult times. When we do, it creates depth of relationship with one another—when we can turn to Him in prayer when we're struggling.

IV. "Learn from Me."

- **A.** Jesus described Himself as <u>humble and gentle</u>, which is truly remarkable. He didn't say that we should learn from Him because He's all-knowing and all-wise, but because His heart is meek and lowly.
- B. In other words, He wants us to know that He is the relaxed environment we need to recharge. We don't have to unplug from daily life only to fear the prayer closet because we feel like we will need to work ourselves up into a frenzy of prayer. No, we can go and be with a lowly Man who is God and just quietly listen and be taught what we need in order to break through.
- C. We're presented with unlimited resources today via technology. See many turn to all the great speakers on the Internet instead of Jesus. This is a huge mistake. We need to learn from people, and read their books, etc. (That's really important actually!) But of far more importance is coming to Jesus Himself and learning directly from Him through His Word, the Scriptures, by the Spirit.

V. "You will find rest for your souls."

- A. Jesus' easy yoke and light burden isn't a promise of an easy life—it's a promise of walking through life with Him in such a way that the unnecessary burdens and difficulties are replaced with <u>the knowledge of Christ's tender and loving meekness</u>. It's a promise of inward peace—even during the trials of life.
- **B.** When we understand that Jesus is humble, and can see it in His eyes and know it about His heart, we tend toward emulating it more. And a humble man or woman receives grace and help and the fresh winds of the Spirit that keep us going with enthusiasm.
