I. Introduction:

- A. I want to encourage you to prayerfully study 1 Samuel 1-3 this week.
- **B.** The words of Hannah's vow that we'll look at tonight, as well as her prayer in chapter two, are especially worthy of prayerful attention.

II. Hannah's situation:

- A. Hannah was facing great distress on three main fronts:
 - 1. She was barren, unable to bear children. (1 Samuel 1:2, 5)
 - 2. Her husband Elkanah's other wife Peninnah was described as "her rival" and actually taunted Hannah for her barrenness, which led to irritation and even misery. (1 Samuel 1:6, 10)
 - 3. The temple leadership, Eli and his sons (Hophni and Phinehas), were compromised and corrupt. (1 Samuel 2:12, 3:13)
 - Note: it's very important to differentiate between imperfect leaders and unrepentant leaders.

III. Hannah's vow:

- **1 Samuel 1:10-11** | ¹⁰ And she was in bitterness of soul, and prayed to the Lord and wept in anguish. ¹¹ Then she made a vow and said, "O Lord of hosts (Lord Almighty, NIV), if You will indeed look on the affliction of Your maidservant and remember me, and not forget Your maidservant, but will give Your maidservant a male child, then I will give him to the Lord all the days of his life, and no razor shall come upon his head."
 - What's unique about Hannah's vow is her unusual level of surrender and commitment. She was fully prepared to completely give away what she wanted from God. Under normal circumstances, a Nazarite vow was committed not by a father or mother, but by the individual. It was typically not a lifelong vow, but for a period of time (Numbers 6:1-21). Also, the normal age of service for a Levitical priest was 25-50, not for life.
 - Hannah's vow that would become Samuel's consecrated life in a way points to the lifelong commitment of the believer.

IV. Three important questions we must answer in life as believers:

1. What will I do with my pain?

- 1 Samuel 1:10 (NIV): "she was in bitterness of soul" ... "and prayed"
- 1 Samuel 1:16 (NIV): "I have been praying here out of my great anguish and grief"
- Pain is inevitable. Will my pain cause me to go deeper in bitterness my whole life, or deeper in God my whole life. Does the trauma of my past become my stumbling block, or my path to a greater consecration?

2. What will I do with my barrenness?

- What do you do when it seems you are producing nothing—when it seems your labors are producing no fruit?
- Do you give up? Do you quit? Do you stop pursing God? Do you respond like Hannah?

3. What will I do with compromised leadership?

- Do I trust God is sovereign over compromised leaders?
- Am I willing to serve the perfect God by means of serving imperfect people?

V. Two related questions for consideration:

- 1. What will I believe about God when I don't get what I want? Have I considered there is something bigger going on?
- 2. What will I do when God gives me what I want? Will I follow through on my commitment(s) to God?
